


Please note:

Semester Courses

Our 16-week semester courses are challenging and comprehensive. Latin 1a	Tuesdays, choose: 9 am-A. Barr 10:15 am-S. Fisher 11:30 am-A. Barr 4 PM-A. Barr	Recommended starting age: 14+ We cover chapters 1-9 in Wheelock's Latin, 7 th ed. using a lively visual approach with plenty of class interaction. Topics include: active voice of the present, future and imperfect tenses; all case uses; the first three declensions; 1 st & 2 nd declension adjectives. Weekly assignments require students to develop good study habits while making rapid progress. First year Latin consists of Latin 1a & Latin 1b.	
Latin 2a	Choose: • Tue 1 PM-A. Barr • Tue 2:15 PM-S. Fisher • Wed 9 am-A. Barr	We cover chapters 20-29 in <i>Wheelock's Latin</i> , 7 th ed . Topics include 4 th & 5 th declension; indirect statement, ablatives absolute, and the subjunctive mood. Students must rise beyond mere memorization of Latin components to understand more complex constructions and grammar. Weekly homework and quizzes will challenge students as passages of Latin get longer & more eloquent. Second year Latin consists of Latin 2a & Latin 2b.	
Latin 3a	Wed 10:15-S. FisherWed 11:30 am-A. BarrThu 4 PM-A. Barr	Sample the complexity and eloquence of real Latin as we read the Vulgate, Caesar, Livy, Ovid, Horace, Cicero & more. Students translate 40-80 lines a week and present their work in class. They continue to build their knowledge of vocabulary, grammar, syntax, literary forms, scansion & context. Build essay writing skills with word study assignments. Microphone headset for 2-way audio required. Third year Latin consists of Latin 3a & Latin 3b.	
AP Latin 4a	Thu 1 PM-A. Barr	Challenging College Board-approved AP course prepares students to take the AP Latin Exam in May of each year (students must make <i>local arrangements</i> for the actual AP exam). In the Autumn we complete AP syllabus selections from Vergil's Aeneid . Strong emphasis on AP essay-writing will bolster student skill and confidence. Students also build strong scansion and sight translation abilities. Class size strictly limited and admission subject to instructor approval based on entry exam. Fourth year Latin consists of Latin 4a & Latin 4b.	
Greek 1a	Tuesdays, choose: • 10:15 am-R. Barr • 2:15 PM-R. Barr	Recommended starting age: 14+ We cover chapters 1-8 of Athenaze Book 1. Mastery of Attic Greek will work wonders for a student's vocabulary and English grammar plus teach students to read a wide selection of Classical, <i>koine</i> , and Biblical authors as they develop great study habits & self-organization. Expect weekly homework and quizzes. First year Greek consists of Greek 1a & Greek 1b.	
Greek 2a	Wed 10:15 am-R. Barr	We cover chapters 17-23 of <i>Athenaze</i> Book 2. Second-year Greek offers new challenges as students move beyond the basics to handle more complex Greek. Readings include adapted passages from Thucydides (history). Second year Greek consists of Greek 2a & Greek 2b.	

Greek 3a	Wed 4 PM-R. Barr	Greek 3a is a reading course for those who have finished the study of Greek grammar. We survey a variety of unaltered ancient Greek texts. Selections include Greek historians, philosophers, playwrights & a passage from the New Testament. Students prepare 40 - 60 lines each week. They present translations in class plus discuss the grammar and syntax of each passage. Students are tested on vocabulary, grammar, syntax and comprehension. Computer microphone required. Third year Greek consists of Greek 3a & Greek 3b.
Greek 4a	Thu 11:30 am-R. Barr	Greek 4a is a reading course for those who finished the Greek 3a/b survey course and wish to build their translation skills by reading the full, unaltered text of Plato's <i>Apology of Socrates</i> , one of the most famous works in the Greek language. Students prepare 60-100 lines each week, present translations in class, plus discuss the grammar and syntax of each passage. Students are tested on vocabulary, grammar, syntax and comprehension of our weekly translations. Computer microphone required. Fourth year Greek consists of Greek 4a & Greek 4b.
Witty Wordsmith: Greek & Lati Word Roots	Thursdays, choose: • 9 am • 2:15 PM -R. Barr all	Recommended ages: 13-18+, the perfect bridge from middle school to high school level courses 70% of English is directly descended from Greek, Latin or related languages so verbal skills get quite a boost when we learn these roots. Most root programs keep students busy for years with dry workbook drudgery. This course will power-boost vocabulary for college entrance exams all in one semester while students have fun with language. Expect weekly homework & regular quizzes. Recommended spring companion course: Barbarian Diagrammarian.
Muse on the Loose: Surve of Greek Literature	Thu 11:30 am -S. Fisher	Recommended ages: 14-18+ We introduce the 5 major genres of Greek literature that are so foundational to Western literature. Muse students read selections in translation from poetry, history, philosophy, drama and science /mathematics. Readings span from the time of Homer down to Hellenistic writers such as Polybius, Callimachus and Galen. We give special attention to the plays of Aristophanes & Euripides, the philosophy of Plato & Aristotle and the historical accounts of Herodotus, Thucydides & Xenophon. Expect four writing assignments requiring creative application of topics covered. Excellent transition course before classes with research papers.
Origins to Odysseus: Myth in Classical Lit. Alpha	Thu 10:15 am -A. Barr	Reading Classical mythology in great literature brings the past and present to brilliant life. We explore the greatest works of Classical literature and set these pieces into their larger historical and cultural context using an interdisciplinary approach that introduces students to the art and archaeology of the ancient Greeks. We cover the Olympians & the Trojan cycle while reading Hesiod's <i>Theogony</i> , Homer's <i>Iliad</i> & <i>Odyssey</i> , tragedy <i>Hecuba</i> , plus more. Expect exams, creative writing, plus we learn how to develop and write a research paper.
Classical History: The Greeks	Wed 1 PM -R. Barr	Recommended ages: 16-18+ Starting with pre-history we finish with Alexander the Great while covering the major historical figures, archaeology, geography and politics of the ancient Greeks from 3000 BC to the 1st century BC. We examine the contributions of the ancient Greeks to modern social and political arenas. Highly visual course introduces art, architecture and archaeology of the ancient Greeks. No textbook required (instructor supplies readings). Expect regular exams. Students will write a research paper.

Recommendations for Your Course of Study

At the Lukeion Project we cater to a child's interests and ability, not his grade level or age *per se*. Most of our semester courses are designed for those working at the high school level. Some learners are ready at 12 to work at *the high school level* while others should certainly wait until they are 15 or 16. Workshops are the perfect entry point for any of our subjects and are great for age 10 through adult in many cases.

Language at The Lukeion Project

Every year Lukeion student make impressive honors scores on national Latin and Greek exams. We ask a lot from our students. In return, they truly master Latin & Greek! By third year, our language students confidently translate satisfying chunks of real passages. All of our language classes are taught at the high school level. Students should be ready to study every day and turn in weekly translations and quizzes. Start your student when he or she is ready for the challenge. Preparatory courses **Witty Wordsmith** & **Barbarian Diagrammarian** provide the ideal groundwork for students starting Latin 1 or Greek 1 the following year.

An emphasis on Research Writing at The Lukeion Project

A core skill for college success is the ability to employ critical thinking and analysis in research writing. This skill is best developed incrementally throughout a student's secondary education. We recommend students start with our **Muse Literature Survey** courses which prompt students to write analytically in a variety of instructor graded assignments. **Myth lit**. and our **Classical History** courses take students through all the steps to write a successful research paper. Once students have written a few of research papers, they are ready for our spring **Advanced Research Writing** semester course during their final years of high school.

Barr	[Prerequisite: Latin 1a or placement exam and approval] In the 2 nd semester we cover chapters 10-19 in Wheelock's Latin , 7 th ed . Topics include: Latin pronouns, the perfect system, third declension i-stems and adjectives, the passive voice of the present and perfect system. Students continue to expand their understanding of Latin verbs. \$12 fee added for National Latin Exam offered in March.
Latin 2b	Choose: Tue 1 PM-A. Barr Tue 2:15 PM-S. Fisher Wed 9 am-A. Barr	[Prerequisite: Latin 2a or placement test and approval] In the 4th semester we cover chapters 30-40 in Wheelock's Latin , 7th ed . Students master the more subtle (and complex) grammatical constructions of the Latin language. Topics include the various uses of the subjunctive in clauses, volo, malo, nolo, fero, fio, eo; supines, gerunds, and gerundives. \$12 fee added for National Latin Exam in March.
Latin 3b	Choose: Wed 10:15-S. Fisher Wed 11:30-A. Barr Thu 4 PM-A. Barr	[Prerequisite: Latin 3a or placement test and approval] We translate selections from the Vulgate, Caesar, Livy, Ovid, Horace, Catullus and more. Students translate 40-80 lines a week and present their work in class. Students continue to develop vocabulary, grammar, syntax; plus literary forms, terms and context covered in our weekly sessions. Microphone for 2-way audio required. \$12 fee added for National Latin Exam in March.
AP Latin 4b	Thu 1 PM-A. Barr	[Prerequisite: Latin 4a or placement test and approval] Challenging College Board-approved course prepares students to take the AP Latin Exam offered in May (students must make local arrangements for this exam). In the Spring we complete AP syllabus selections from Caesar's de Bello Gallico. \$12 fee added for National Latin Exam in March.
Greek 1b	Tuesdays Choose: • 10:15 am-R. Barr • 2:15 PM-R. Barr	[Prerequisite: Greek 1a or placement test and approval] Mastery of Attic Greek will not only work wonders for a student's vocabulary and English grammar, but will also permit students to read a wide selection of Greek: Classical, koine, & Biblical authors. Learning Greek will perfect study habits, develop self-organization skills, and round out education. This semester we cover chapters 9-16 of Athenaze Book 1. Expect weekly homework & quizzes. \$12 fee added for National Greek Exam.
Greek 2b	Wed 10:15 am -R. Barr	[Prerequisite: Greek 2a or placement test and approval] This semester completes the students' study of Greek grammar and includes a taste of reading undiluted Greek. Readings include passages from Thucydides, Herodotus (history), and Aristophanes (comedy). We cover chapters 24-30- of Athenaze Book 2. \$12 fee added for National Greek Exam.
Greek 3b	Wed 4 PM -R. Barr	[Prerequisite: Greek 3a or placement test] We continue our survey of unaltered ancient Greek texts from a variety of ancient authors. This semester we read an Athenian court defense speech in its entirety, as well as selections from Homer's <i>Iliad</i> and <i>Odyssey</i> , and an excerpt from Greek comedy. Students prepare a translation of 40-60 lines each week and present their translations in class plus discuss the grammar and syntax of each passage. Computer microphone required. \$12 fee added for National Greek Exam in March.
Greek 4b	Thu 11:30 am -R. Barr	[Prerequisite: Greek 4a or placement test] Students continue to build translation skills by reading extended selections from Xenophon's Anabasis. Students prepare a translation of 60-100 lines each week and present translations in class plus discuss the grammar and syntax of each passage. Students will take quizzes on vocabulary, grammar, syntax and comprehension of our weekly translations. Computer microphone required. \$12 fee added for National Greek Exam in March.

Barbarian Diagrammarian Visual Grammar for the Bold & Daring	Thursdays Choose: • 9 am • 2:15 PM -R. Barr	Recommended ages: 13-18+, perfect bridge from middle school to high school level courses Who's afraid of a little grammar? We can show you how to put it in its place! Are you ready to split some infinitives dangle some participles? This visual approach offers students the skills needed to start Latin, begin Greek, and claim ascendency over the English language. Master grammatical jargon, put nouns right where they belong, and get your hands on all the best weapons for defeating English grammar before it ever gets the better of you. Witty Wordsmith is a recommended companion course but not a prerequisite.

Fisher	Recommended ages: 14 -18+, Companion to Muse on the Loose We introduce the literature of the Romans from the earliest interpretations of Greek dramas through the writings of the Imperial Age. Through drama, poetry, history, philosophy, and satire students will follow the history and thought life of the Roman people through the eyes of its poets and statesmen. Authors include Plautus, Lucretius, Cicero, Catullus, Horace, Vergil, Ovid, Petronius, Livy, Josephus, and Tacitus in translation. Expect four writing assignments requiring creative application of topics covered. Excellent transitional course between essay writing and research papers.
Dudes & Deeds: Myth in Classical Lit. Beta	Thu 10:15 am -A. Barr	Recommended ages: 15-18+, Companion to Myth Alpha In Mythology Beta we focus on literature and tales about the ancient heroes Hercules, Perseus, Theseus, and Jason plus focus on Roman mythological literature with a reading of Vergil's Aeneid and Ovid's Metamorphoses. Greek tragedies Oedipus Rex and Medea round out the semester. Expect exams, creative writing and a research paper.
Classical History: The Romans	Wed 1 PM -A. Barr	Recommended ages: 16 -18+ [Companion to Classical History: the Greeks] A highly visual approach to Roman history starts with Rome's mythic beginnings and ends with Constantine. We will cover major historical figures, innovations and law through primary and secondary sources, art and archaeology. We also examine Roman contributions to the modern world in society, law, politics, art, and architecture. No textbook required, instructor supplies materials. Expect exams & research paper.
Advanced Research Writing	Wed 2:15 PM -R. Barr	Recommended ages: 16 -18+ [Best after students have had Muse series, Lukeion Myth, or History previously] The dreaded research paper assignment strikes fear in the heart of most, and many will spend several years floundering around at college before they begin to discover (through trial and error) what professors expect and what makes a good research paper. Before arriving on a college campus, students must develop the tools & techniques of scholarly research, and how to write a persuasive & authoritative research paper under a deadline. The ideal participant is in the final years of high school , has composition experience, meets deadlines, has good study skills, gives & takes constructive criticism maturely. Students must have access to a college or university library in his/her area.
The Classical Bard: Shakespeare's Greeks & Romans	Thu 2:15 -R. Baty	Recommended ages: 16 -18+ [Best after students have had Muse series, Lukeion Myth, or History previously] The Bard of Avon loved Classical themes almost as much as we do. Get ready to visit some of his very best pieces in this one semester course. We will cover Shakespeare's Roman plays (Julius Caesar, Antony and Cleopatra, & Coriolanus) plus A Midsummer Night's Dream set in ancient Athens. Along the way we will examine how ancient writers influenced Shakesespeare's ideas. Expect exams and writing projects. There will be group reading (of course) so a microphone is required.

Workshops

The First War: Homer's <i>Iliad</i>	9 am ET 4 days in a row: May 30- June 2, 2016	Of the many stories about the Trojan War, no title is more recognizable than Homer's <i>Iliad</i> . This epic is absolutely essential to understanding the national identity of both the ancient Greeks & Romans. Did you know that it doesn't include the whole Trojan story? This well illustrated workshop will place Achilles and his fellow-warriors in their context by filling in the gaps with the info that Homer assumed you already know. We'll investigate the site and story-lines that Homer leaves out, plus the geographical and cultural context and the themes that make this epic relevant today. Parental guidance: strong warfare themes. Especially recommended for rising AP Latin IV students.
Of Men and Monsters: Homer's <i>Odyssey</i>	2:15 PM ET 4 days in a row: May 30- June 2, 2016	One of the first recorded adventure stories was written so well that modern readers include it on their favorites list. Clashing rocks, one-eyed man-eating monsters, evil villains and undying love – it has something for everyone. This illustrated workshop will help you better understand the great work by including discussions from archaeology, geography, and related literature that all illuminate this masterpiece of Greek literature.
